

From the early 1900's thru the 1960s, the City burned municipal waste in incinerators* including the 5th & Cleveland, Forest Street and Southside Incinerators.


^{*} Incinerator was a common method of waste disposal at that time.




The bottom ash from the incinerators was disposed at dump sites or used to fill low areas.

The ash was also given to residents to use as fill.


The health or contamination threats were not known at that time.








Incinerator Site – Forest Street (EPA)

In the 1980s, the City discovered a deposit of ash near Moncrief Creek in what became the Brown's Dump Site.

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) conducted assessment sampling in the 1980's but contamination was not confirmed until later in 1995.

The City completed an assessment of Brown's Dump and the Jacksonville Ash Sites (5th & Cleveland, Forest Street and Lonnie Miller) in 1998 and proceeded with sampling to delineate the boundaries of the sites thru 2005.

The EPA evaluated the sampling results and issued a Record of Decision in 2006.



In 2005, the City remediated of the 5th & Cleveland Incinerator site to create the Malvai Washington Tennis Center.

On July 17, 2008, the City and EPA entered into a Consent Decree for the remediation of the Brown's Dump and Jacksonville Ash Sites (the EPA Ash Sites).

In summer of 2008, the City remediated the Darnell-Cookman Middle School, John E. Ford Elementary School and the new Animal Care & Control Facility.

In summer of 2009, the city remediated the St. Stephens school and church properties.

In the beginning of 2010, the City began the remediation of all four EPA Ash Sites (Phase 1).



Since 2010, the City has completed the following:

At present, project is over 90% complete.



The Consent Decree requires that the City provide the following:

- > Remediation of contamination within the top two feet of soil.
- > Annotation of the property record cards of properties within the Site boundaries.
- > Create a geographic information system for display of the properties within the Sites.
- > Provide annual notification for all properties within the Sites.
- > Create a review process for construction on parcels within the Sites.



In 2010, the City was sued by property owners in the Springfield neighborhood because the contamination warnings were put on their property record cards.

These Plaintiffs believed the warnings were improperly attached to their property record cards because their properties were outside of the Site boundaries specifically defined in the Consent Decree.

In November 2012, the City and Plaintiffs settled (2012-628-E) and the City removed the contamination warnings from all property record cards for properties outside of the Site boundaries per the Consent Decree in exchange for the Plaintiff's dismissing the suit. *Blanchard v. Overton*, Case No.: 3-10-cv-00712-HES-TEM



The City will be entering into a contract with a remediation contractor for the 5th & Cleveland Phase 7 remediation which includes remediation of the remaining parcels (remnant parcels) within the other Sites.

The 5th & Cleveland Phase 7 includes the following:

5th & Cleveland – 75 parcels

Other Sites – 51 parcels

The priority focus is on Residential parcels.

Upon the completion of Phase 7, the project will be 95% complete and all residential parcels with access agreements will be completed.



The City is currently preparing the design plans for the remediation and redevelopment of Lonnie Miller Park.

The City plans to complete the design plan and begin construction of Phase 1 in 2018.

Phase 1 plans currently include:

- > Remediation of the eastern half of the Park.
- Construction of a tennis center (7 courts).
- Construction of a basketball facility (8 courts).
- Construction of a walking path.



Ash remediation is only conducted on parcels if access agreements are signed by the property owner.

Upon completion of the 5th & Cleveland Phase 7 remediation, the City will have remediated all the residential parcels with access agreements.


The remaining parcels will include:


- > Approximately 100 parcels that do not have an access agreement.
- ➤ The Forest Street Incinerator Site and adjacent park and former school parcels.
- > The Mission parcel in Lonnie Miller (a low/wetland area).
- ➤ The FDOT parcels in 5th & Cleveland adjacent to I-95 (in discussion with FDOT about their future use of the parcels).






FOREST STREET PARCEL STATUS - March 27, 2018


















- ➤ Contract for the 5th & Cleveland Part 7 remediation construction is \$6.1 million
- Contract for Southside Incinerator remediation construction is \$2.48 million
- ➤ Gold Merit and Pope Place have approximately \$7.4 million allocated for site cleanup efforts
- > CIP currently lists \$9 million for future ash cleanup efforts
- > CIP allocations for ash cleanup is currently under review
