1	PROCEEDINGS
2	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Good afternoon.
3	We're going to call the Special Committee of
4	the Future of JEA to order. Today is
5	Thursday, June 7th, 2018, about 3:31 in the
6	afternoon.
7	We'll begin by having everyone introduce
8	themselves for the record. I would start on
9	the right, but there is no right. So we'll
10	start over here on the left.
11	COUNCIL MEMBER FERRARO: Al Ferraro,
12	District 2.
13	COUNCIL MEMBER BOWMAN: Aaron Bowman,
14	District 3.
15	COUNCIL MEMBER ANDERSON: Greg Anderson,
16	At-Large Group 4.
17	COUNCIL MEMBER MORGAN: Joyce Morgan,
18	District 1.
19	COUNCIL MEMBER BECTON: Danny Becton,
20	District 11.
21	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: John Crescimbeni,
22	At-Large Group 2.
23	PRESIDENT BROSCHE: Anna Lopez-Brosche,
24	Group 1.
25	COUNCIL MEMBER BOYER: Lori Boyer,

1	District 5.
2	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: That is it. I
3	think I did have a few few, I say that
4	lightly excused absences. I have one
5	from Council Member Love, he's excused;
6	Councilman Schellenberg; Councilman
7	Gulliford; Councilman Newby; Councilman
8	Hazouri; Councilman Carter; and Councilman
9	Wilson. They are all excused and will not
10	be here today.
11	We have a few residual items on our
12	agenda that are left over from JEA.
13	Mr. Pope, I think you're going to handle
14	those. And I'm not I didn't get a
15	postcard from the Magic Kingdom. I don't
16	know if anybody else did anybody else get
17	a postcard? No. So how was the reprieve
18	from the May 24th meeting?
19	MR. POPE: Jordan Pope, JEA. It was
20	very nice, thank you. Although, I did watch
21	part of the meeting on my phone. I really
22	did.
23	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Sure, you did,
24	Jordan.
25	MR. POPE: Your postcard is

1	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: I was hoping
2	you'd say that, because I have a little quiz
3	here that has 10 questions from the last
4	meeting. So can we give this to Jordan and
5	have him complete this? No, I'm just
6	kidding.
7	MR. POPE: How about we do that one next
8	week? Then I can go watch the video.
9	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Do you have a
10	copy of the agenda?
11	MR. POPE: Yes, sir, I do. Thank you,
12	Mr. Chairman.
13	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Welcome back.
14	MR. POPE: Thank you. I believe you
15	should have a handout. And my goal today is
16	to finish the outstanding items from
17	previous weeks. And so we'll get right into
18	that.
19	The first one is tab 8, which is a
20	follow-up to a question from Council Member
21	Anderson. So the first two slides that say
22	JEA Electric Sales and Water Sales you
23	previously were given. I thought it would
24	be good to include those in case someone
25	didn't have their notebook.

Τ	But the slide that says Revenues is
2	responsive to a question from Council Member
3	Anderson who wanted to see projected
4	revenues in line with the sales projections
5	that we had previously provided. So the
6	revenues relate to the 2017 sales
7	projections on the prior slide, so the
8	orange, or red, line depending on how you
9	see it. And you can see that those revenues
10	slightly increase consistent with the slight
11	increase in sales projections from the prior
12	two slides.
13	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: You're going to
14	have to back up. I think you lost me. So
15	on the revenue slide, you have three
16	different you have electric base,
17	electric fuel, and water/sewer. And how is
18	that relating to the sales graph?
19	MR. POPE: Yes, sir. So these are
20	projected revenues based on the sales
21	projections from the prior two slides, the
22	2017 sales projections.
23	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: I see what you're
24	saying, okay.
25	MR. POPE: Yes, sir. Which would be the

Τ	red, or orange, line.
2	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: All right. Any
3	questions on that? Mr. Anderson, did that
4	answer your
5	COUNCIL MEMBER ANDERSON: It did.
6	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Okay. Go ahead,
7	Mr. Pope.
8	MR. POPE: Behind tab 4 is a revised
9	rate comparison chart that the Council
10	Auditor asked us to redo. On a previous
11	chart that we had provided, the first few
12	years we compared the rates at 1,250
13	kilowatt hours, which was more in line with
14	a typical bill at the time. As usage came
15	down a bit, the comparison went to 1,000
16	kilowatt hours.
17	So what we did at the Council Auditor's
18	request is provided a comparison across all
19	of the years at 1,000 kilowatt hours. So
20	this is really not much different from the
21	prior version given other than to reflect
22	only 1,000 kilowatt hours in the first
23	couple of years.
24	And this would include all of the fees,
25	storm fees included. And this is only a

1	comparison to investor-owned utilities in
2	the state of Florida.
3	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: So on your line
4	that says Miami FP&L, that's just FP&L
5	anywhere in Florida; is that right?
6	MR. POPE: My understanding is it's FP&I
7	with the taxes that would be levied in the
8	city of Miami.
9	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: I see what you're
10	saying, okay.
11	MR. POPE: Or other charges.
12	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Okay. Any
13	questions on that?
14	All right. Mr. Pope.
15	MR. POPE: Behind tab 2, during public
16	comment a few meetings ago, I said that we
17	would follow up on a bit of a different
18	comparison when looking at the cost to
19	operate the St. Johns River Power Park
20	versus purchasing power from Plant Wansley
21	in Georgia. And so what we've added at the
22	bottom of this comparison is a cost to
23	produce that energy on a megawatt hour
24	basis. So you can see that there is still
25	quite a significant difference in the cost

1	to produce that power even when you compare
2	it on a megawatt hour basis, even though the
3	power park could produce 1,000 was at
4	1,000 megawatts and we're purchasing 200
5	from Plant Wansley, there is still quite a
6	difference in the cost to produce that
7	power.
8	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Mr. Ferraro, I
9	think you had a question about this. Does
LO	that satisfy your question?
L1	COUNCIL MEMBER FERRARO: Yes.
12	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Okay. Anybody
L3	else have a question on that one?
L 4	All right.
15	MR. POPE: Behind tab 12, Councilman
16	Becton had requested some additional
17	information on solar installations and cost.
L8	It's my understanding that, from the meeting
19	two weeks ago, a public commenter provided
20	some cost information to you all. So what I
21	have provided here is not necessarily cost
22	information since JEA, we're not installing
23	solar panels on private or in private
24	applications at this time; although, we've
>5	talked about perhaps doing that down the

1	road. But what I thought would be helpful
2	is to provide our consumers guide to solar
3	power. This is a great resource we provide
4	to our customers on our website. And so I
5	just I pulled this, what is really a
6	booklet, from our website. You can go to
7	JEA.com, and I will be happy to send you the
8	link to this and many other pages on there
9	that will provide information.
10	And I don't intend to walk through this
11	presentation necessarily, but there is a lot
12	of information, we give customers a lot of
13	information to think about in the
14	considerations before they would make the
15	decision to install solar panels on their
16	roof.
17	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Do you all
18	recommend any is there any kind of solar

CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Do you all recommend any -- is there any kind of solar certified contractor or anything, I mean, for -- is there any commentary in this material on your website that steers people to specific types of contractors, not necessarily a specific company, but just specific qualified contractors?

MR. POPE: To the Chair, we do provide a

1	list of additional resources. And I think
2	it's the last page of the of this
3	particular presentation in the handout we've
4	given.
5	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Okay. I see
6	that.
7	MR. POPE: But it is not specific to any
8	one installation company.
9	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Do you have any
10	idea how many people in the Jacksonville
11	area install solar arrays for residential
12	and commercial applications?
13	MR. POPE: No, sir, I do not.
14	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: All right.
15	Mr. Becton.
16	COUNCIL MEMBER BECTON: Thank you.
17	Through the Chair, Mr. Pope, so you had
18	mentioned that we did receive some
19	information from some you know, an
20	outside source in terms of showing us some
21	different installations. Did you happen to
22	see that?
23	MR. POPE: I've looked at it, yes, sir.
24	I haven't I mean, I've looked at it; I
25	haven't necessarily studied it.

1	COUNCIL MEMBER BECTON: Okay. I guess
2	my question was going to be did you have any
3	disagreement or did you find it factual
4	enough to consider it being something that I
5	can count on, since my question here didn't
6	specifically get answered?

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MR. POPE: Through the Chair to

Councilman Becton, I would be happy to have

some of our internal groups look at that

handout if you wanted to maybe determine the

factual basis for inclusion in a report that

this Committee might produce.

But again, as far as the costs go, there are so many variables. And again, JEA is not in the business of, you know, putting those panels on in a private application at this point in time. So it's really market-driven. You know, if you asked a different contractor if you have a certain type of roof, if you lived in a certain part of town that had more trees than others or wasn't southern facing. There are so many different factors that, without knowing all of the specifics of what was handed out, I don't know that we could make a true

determination.

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COUNCIL MEMBER BECTON: Well, through the Chair, since this Committee is now the future of JEA, the question was certainly trying to understand where the -- you know, what opportunity there was. And I understand on anything there is always factors that change things, but usually not that dramatically. And, yes, while that's true, I was just hoping for this Committee to just get an understanding what the opportunity was.

In other words, on a typical installation that I might see my neighbor do, I can sit here and make an observation that I usually see, I think, four or five panels. And I was trying to just understand how much electricity does that generate in comparison to what do we as consumers in our households generate on a daily basis and how, you know -- and what percentage of that generation is part of that demand that we're occurring and -- you know, just that whole mechanics of, if someone has never done it, like myself, put a solar panel on my roof,

1 you know, what could be my expectations and 2 how much could I expect to generate in a, 3 what I'll call, typical situation, or an average situation, that one might employ 4 5 here in the state of Florida with the type of weather that we have. 6 7 So that was really just the core, not 8 holding your feet to the fire, as they say, 9 to give me a price that you have to hold to 10 for the next 90 days and sell me on, but 11 just to help us understand what the 12 opportunity was for a residential 13 installation. Do you follow me? 14 MR. POPE: Through the Chair to 15 Councilman Becton, it might be helpful if I 16 and two other people from JEA come meet with 17 you and let's get those specific questions 18 answered and make sure we can -- we really 19

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1	yeah, we kind of agree with that. I think
2	it was probably from someone who worked at
3	JEA that sent that to us. It's been a few
4	weeks now since I've looked at it, but I
5	thought it was, you know, well if somebody
6	kind of looks at it and says, yeah, we kind
7	of agree with that.
8	MR. POPE: We'll take a closer look at
9	it and respond.
10	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Mr. Becton, are
11	you talking about the information that was
12	sent to us following someone that spoke
13	during public comment period?
14	COUNCIL MEMBER BECTON: Yes, sir.
15	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Okay. And that
16	was just a couple of quotes on some on an
17	installation at two different residential
18	properties, if I recall.
19	COUNCIL MEMBER BECTON: Something like
20	that.
21	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: So who do you
22	have at JEA that would have expertise on
23	whether those numbers were accurate or not?
24	MR. POPE: Through the Chair to
25	Councilman Crescimbeni or to the Chair,

1	rather, we have program managers who are
2	responsible for this document and work with
3	our customers who are coming in to install
4	these systems at their homes who would have
5	a good idea of the market. I think it's
6	going to be the JEA analysis. We're not
7	going to say it's firm and, yes, this is
8	perfect. But I think we can give a test to
9	reasonableness.
10	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: So you'll work
11	with Mr. Becton on that?
12	MR. POPE: Yes, sir.
13	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: All right. Thank
14	you.
15	Any other questions on item D, the solar
16	installation?
17	All right. Mr. Pope.
18	MR. POPE: Behind tab 6 is a list of
19	technology services projects from our water
20	capital budget. And I'll just preface this
21	by saying that the JEA Board has not yet
22	proposed the FY '19 capital budget, which
23	will happen in 12 days, I think.
24	But Councilman Anderson had asked what
25	was included in a line item that I think was

1	in the amount of \$4.1 million in our capital
2	budget. So what you have here is a list of
3	various technology services projects. The
4	first three are specific to our water
5	system. The following are all shared.
6	And what that means is, when we
7	undertake a project in our technology
8	services group that has benefit to both the
9	electric system and the water and sewer
10	system, there is a split that happens
11	between those projects. Part of it is taker
12	up by the electric system and the other part
13	by the water system. And so what may be
14	included what is included in that line
15	item are some of these projects where that
16	cost would be shared.
17	And so we can provide additional detail
18	as the budget is finalized and, of course,
19	as we go through the process. But this is
20	just a list of projects that may be included
21	in that line item as we move forward.
22	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Mr. Anderson, did
23	you have a follow-up?
24	COUNCIL MEMBER ANDERSON: These were
25	capital items; right?

1	MR. POPE: Yes, sir.
2	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Any other
3	questions on that?
4	Mr. Pope, you have a couple things from
5	the meeting of May 24th.
6	MR. POPE: Yes, sir. There were two
7	questions asked at the last meeting that we
8	have provided responses to. I'm happy to
9	read them into the record if you would like
10	me to. Otherwise, we provide these as a
11	response to the questions.
12	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Well, you can
13	either read them into the record or
14	paraphrase them, but, yeah, we're going to
15	need you to kind of, like, respond on the
16	record.
17	MR. POPE: Yes, sir. I'll be happy I
18	will just read this page if you're agreeable
19	to that. These are additional questions
20	from the May 24th, 2018, JEA special
21	committee meeting or the Special
22	Committee on the Future of JEA. Council
23	President Brosche referenced an email
24	received by all Council Members this week
25	from the JEA stating that, absent any future

1	Board action, no further action would be
2	taken on potential privatization of JEA.
3	Ms. Brosche asked whether that implied that
4	the JEA would not be providing information
5	or otherwise cooperating with the special
6	committee or other ongoing studies of the
7	JEA.
8	Nancy Kilgo of the JEA said that she
9	will convey the question to the Board, but
10	understands that the JEA will continue to be
11	cooperative with the ongoing studies. JEA
12	provides this response
13	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Hang on one
14	second. I have to let my court reporter
15	cath up, because you were doing a FedEx
16	commercial there.
17	MR. POPE: I'm sorry. I'll slow down.
18	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Ready? Okay.
19	All right. Go ahead, Mr. Pope.
20	MR. POPE: JEA will continue to provide
21	information and support to the Council
22	Special Committee on the Future of JEA, the
23	duPont funds consultant and the Civic
24	Council. JEA staff will strive to provide
25	what each group is asking on the various

information requests. This response was

approved by interim CEO Aaron Zahn as there

have been no JEA Board meetings since the

May 24th Special Committee meeting.

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Council Member Dennis requested information from the JEA on how the JEA Board established the compensation for Aaron Zahn and Melissa Dykes, the interim CEO and COO.

JEA provides this response: Interim CEO
Aaron Zahn proposed the compensation for
Melissa Dykes and himself. He derived the
proposed interim CEO's salary by reducing
the salary earned by Paul McElroy in order
to provide an appropriate salary increase
for the President COO position held by
Melissa Dykes and to provide additional
salary for the interim CFO. The JEA Board
reviewed and approved the recommended
salaries for Mr. Zahn and Ms. Dykes at the
Board's compensation committee and at the
full Board.

CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Okay. So are you saying that there was no -- there's no net increase or decrease in salary expense for

1	those three positions, that aggregately
2	they're using the same salary dollars?
3	MR. POPE: To the Chair, I don't know
4	that that is necessarily what it means. And
5	I would have to ask on the aggregate of
6	those three salaries to see where it ended
7	up compared to Mr. McElroy's.
8	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Okay. Because I
9	think what I'm reading there in that
10	response is that today's A, B, and C equals
11	the same total as two months ago, A, B, and
12	C. Is that the way you read it?
13	MR. POPE: Yes, sir.
14	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: All right. But
15	you can give us a clarification on that via
16	email or something?
17	MR. POPE: I'll be happy to do that.
18	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Mr. Dennis.
19	COUNCIL MEMBER DENNIS: Through the
20	Chair, Mr. Pope, thank you for being here.
21	Go back to that response. Did you say that
22	Mr. Zahn came up with the compensation for
23	all three positions?
24	MR. POPE: Through the Chair to
25	Councilman Dennis, the response says he

1 derived the proposed interim CEO salary by 2 reducing the salary earned by Paul McElroy 3 in order to provide an appropriate salary increase for the President COO position held 4 5 by Melissa Dykes and to provide additional salary for the interim CFO. 6 7 COUNCIL MEMBER DENNIS: Now, through the 8 Chair, I thought you said that Mr. Zahn --9 read the entire statement. 10 MR. POPE: Sure. Interim CEO Aaron Zahn 11 proposed the compensation for Melissa Dykes 12 and himself. He derived the proposed 13 interim CEO salary by reducing the salary 14 earned by Paul McElroy in order to provide 15 an appropriate salary increase for the 16 President COO position held by Melissa Dykes 17 and to provide additional salary for the 18 interim CFO. 19 COUNCIL MEMBER DENNIS: So through the 20 Chair to Mr. Pope and maybe to the 21

COUNCIL MEMBER DENNIS: So through the

Chair to Mr. Pope and maybe to the

Committee, so is that common for a CEO to

propose their own salary or is it the board

sets the salary? I'm not just talking about

JEA, but across the spectrum when you have a

board, CEO or executive director

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1	relationship. I don't know if you can
2	answer that or one of my colleagues can help
3	me out.
4	MR. POPE: Through the Chair, I'm not
5	familiar with what is most appropriate in
6	these cases. I can simply tell you what
7	happened in this case.
8	COUNCIL MEMBER DENNIS: All right.
9	Thank you.
10	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: You don't want to
11	ask him if he sets his own salary?
12	COUNCIL MEMBER DENNIS: That's a good
13	question.
14	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: I know the
15	answer.
16	All right. Any other questions for
17	Mr. Pope? Any other JEA questions? Because
18	this is the end of the line on JEA
19	questions.
20	All right. Mr. Pope, I have two things
21	for you.
22	MR. POPE: Yes, sir.
23	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: First of all,
24	you're familiar with, like, I think the
25	Chamber of Commerce each year takes a trip

1 to another city to kind of see what that 2 city is doing, what is working and what 3 they've learned doesn't work and we try to bring back ideas to --4 5 MR. POPE: Yes, sir. 6 CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: -- plagiarize or steal and implement over here. Does JEA 7 8 ever visit -- like, do the electric folks 9 ever go visit the other electric utilities, 10 whether they're municipals or investor 11 owned, and on the water side, do they go and 12 visit other water or wastewater utilities to 13 kind of see what their best practices are 14 and bring things home to try to implement? 15 Or do you glean information like that from 16 some sort of national meetings or 17 conferences or something? How is that --

those arenas?

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MR. POPE: To the Chair, JEA undertakes both. So we're certainly a part of different industry associations where we go to different conferences and there are other utilities there. And we can learn from each other in their presentations and so forth

what kind of activities does JEA partake in

1	about things that are happening in the
2	utility industry. I don't know with what
3	frequency, but I do know of cases, even
4	recently, where JEA has gone to other cities
5	or utilities to learn what they are doing
6	with different technologies and best
7	practices, as you said. So we employ both.
8	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Do we have other
9	utilities that come and see what we're doing
10	in the wastewater and wastewater (sic)
11	business and/or the electric business?
12	MR. POPE: To the Chair, I'm sure we do.
13	I can think of one instance. There are
14	probably more going on the operational side,
15	so I may not be involved as much or hear
16	about that as much. But I would be happy
17	to I'm sure that that has happened. I
18	can think of one instance and I'm sure it
19	has happened many others.
20	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Can you give me a
21	two-year history on electric and water side
22	of, you know, where JEA has been and who has
23	been to visit us?
24	MR. POPE: I will do my best, yes, sir.
25	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: I know when this

city first abandoned the private ambulance model and went to a municipal fire -- a municipal rescue service, we had cities coming here almost weekly to see how did you come up with this idea, is it working. It's kind of become the national model. But we were, like, one of the original pioneers in that concept. So I didn't know if there was anything like that going on in the electric or water/wastewater business, so if you can kind of help me out.

MR. POPE: Yes, sir.

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I want to talk to you about was you submitted to us previously a list of sponsorships, contributions, I forgot what word we were going to decide to use with regard to that. And I wanted to make sure that that was a comprehensive list. I thought it was a comprehensive list, but I went to do some yard work a couple of weeks ago and I put on my original Tire & Snipe Sign Buyback T-shirt, and I noticed on the back all these logos, one of which was the JEA logo. And I went back to my report and

1 I didn't see any reference in there. So how 2 did you guys get a logo on the Tire Buyback shirts if you didn't make some sort of 3 contribution to that. 4 5 And then I went back and looked at my successive years T-shirts, I think the first 6 7 one was in 2015, and my successive years 8 T-shirts also had the JEA logo. So I want 9 to make sure that list was comprehensive. 10 And maybe I missed it on the report, but I 11 checked it a couple of times and I didn't 12 see anything in there about the City's 13 Annual Tire & Snipe Sign Buyback. 14 Do you see it, Ms. Kilgo? It looks like 15 you -- or Mr. Bruderly, whoever you are. 16 MR. POPE: To the Chair, as Ms. Kilgo 17 walks up, it was meant to be comprehensive. 18 And Ms. Kilgo spent a lot of time, as did 19 many others on this, but I'll let her 20 respond. 21 MS. KILGO: Thank you. Nancy Kilgo. To 2.2 the Chair, I would say that there is high 23 possibility everything might not be on that 24 list, because it happens out of different

call centers, et cetera. We try to do the

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1	most comprehensive list we could. There are
2	other programs like our partnerships with
3	water management where we have an obligation
4	to provide conservation messaging,
5	et cetera, that may not be on that list.
6	We'll certainly find out on Tire Buyback how
7	that happens. And go look at the list one
8	more time. But I would be hesitant to say
9	absolutely it's a totally inclusive list.
10	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Okay. If you can
11	go back and just at least check on that one
12	item. If you're looking for that and you
13	see anything else that we might need to
14	amend that list with, I would welcome an
15	updated list.
16	MS. KILGO: We'll do it. Thank you.
17	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Thank you all for
18	being here today.
19	Anything else from the Committee?
20	MR. POPE: Mr. Chairman, I just I
21	believe it's actually an in-kind for JEA
22	placing each year on their bill insert the
23	Tire Buyback as a promotion. But we'll
24	confirm that.
25	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: All right. Is

1	there value to that? Do you do anything
2	else on your bills in terms of
3	notifications? That's not a purchasable
4	MR. POPE: No, sir. It's only JEA
5	information, from time to time the City.
6	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Okay. Thank you,
7	Mr. Pope. If you can clarify that, that
8	would be excellent.
9	All right. We had talked at our last
10	meeting about a draft report from this
11	Committee. Mr. Clements he's not here
12	today. Mr. Clements drafted an outline and
13	it's a long way from a final report or a
14	final draft report. So he and I are going
15	to have to kind of spend some time together
16	and see if we can get back to a finished
17	product. I doubt we can get that done by
18	next week.
19	So I don't have anything else really.
20	There is no residual items at this point.
21	The Council Auditor is up to date on
22	everything. JEA is now up to date on
23	everything with a couple of little minor
24	things we've talked about today.
25	So the only thing I see that's

1	outstanding is kind of a draft completion
2	report from the Committee. So my
3	recommendation would be that we not meet
4	next Thursday. And hopefully we can get
5	something out to the Committee by either
6	late next week or early the following week
7	that will give you something to read prior
8	to Thursday the 21st.
9	Unless anybody else has anything they
10	want to add to our list of things we need to
11	follow, I think we're at a point where we're
12	just going to have to get the report drafted
13	and submitted.
14	Any comments or questions on that? Does
15	anybody have heartburn not meeting next
16	Thursday? I mean, I can go ahead and
17	schedule a meeting if you want.
18	COUNCIL MEMBER BECTON: I'm good.
19	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: You're good,
20	okay.
21	Also, I think we heard from a guy last
22	week from the University of Florida,
23	Mr. Kury. And there was an interesting
24	article that came out in Popular Science
25	magazine yesterday about undergrounding.

1	And he was really downplaying the benefits
2	of he was quoted in the article and he
3	seemed to be downplaying the benefits of
4	undergrounding as compared to costs
5	associated with undergrounding, which I
6	thought was interesting. I'll send that
7	article out to everybody.
8	All right. If that's everything for
9	today, anybody else have any comments or
10	anything? Do we have any public speaker
11	cards?
12	COUNCIL MEMBER FERRARO: I do have a
13	comment.
14	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Mr. Ferraro, go
15	ahead.
16	COUNCIL MEMBER FERRARO: Mr. Chairman, I
17	would like to ask Mr. Pope if he could come
18	up and speak, if it's all right with you
19	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Sure.
20	COUNCIL MEMBER FERRARO: about the
21	implosion of the towers. We're getting a
22	lot of calls right now to find out about the
23	time, which road closures, what phone
24	numbers to call and things like that.
25	So, Mr. Pope, if you can help get some

of these answers.

MR. POPE: Yes, sir. As you all know,

JEA and Florida Power & Light retired the

St. Johns River Power Park in January of

this year. And part of that is the -- part

of the decommissioning of the plant is the

implosion of the two large cooling towers

that you're probably all familiar with. And

you will all be getting additional

information in email form from me tomorrow.

But just as a way of general information that Councilman Ferraro has asked for, the planned implosion is Saturday, June 16th at approximately 8 o'clock in the morning.

There will be some limited road closures on New Berlin Road as part of the implosion event. And I will send a map so that you all can see that. The road closures are planned from approximately 6:45 in the morning to 9:00 in the morning. Some local businesses will be impacted by the road closure. We will be working with them to make sure they have the access they need during that time, but our real concern, of course, is public safety down New Berlin

1	Road as that's taking place at roughly
2	8 o'clock in the morning.
3	The towers are each about 464 feet tall,
4	so it will be a noticeable difference in the
5	skyline and it will be a noticeable event.
6	But we will be taking every precaution
7	and we will you'll, again, be getting
8	more information from me tomorrow.
9	This is a significant event for the St.
10	Johns River Power Park and all the great
11	people that worked there and the great 30
12	years of service that plant gave to this
13	community.
14	COUNCIL MEMBER FERRARO: Mr. Pope, can
15	you give us the phone number for residents
16	or businesses who want to contact JEA to
17	find out information, how this would affect
18	their employees or their homes?
19	MR. POPE: Yes, sir. Any businesses or
20	residents who have questions or concerns can
21	call our Project Outreach Team at 665-7500.
22	And I'll be sure to include that in my
23	written communication.
24	COUNCIL MEMBER FERRARO: And the final
25	question, after this is all over, will this

1	be the same number that people would call if
2	they have any other problems or questions?
3	MR. POPE: Yes, sir. Any issues after
4	the fact, same number.
5	COUNCIL MEMBER FERRARO: Okay. So
6	Tuesday night you will have a map showing
7	this so people during Council will be able
8	to look at this visually and see where the
9	road closures would be and things like that?
10	MR. POPE: Yes, sir. I'll send the
11	Council the road closure map tomorrow and
12	Council Tuesday night will have it available
13	on the screen so that everyone can see where
14	those will take place.
15	COUNCIL MEMBER FERRARO: Thank you for
16	your help.
17	Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
18	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Mr. Pope, while
19	we're on this topic, let me ask you a
20	question: Last time there was an implosion
21	anywhere around here, it was across the
22	street. And the Council had moved into this
23	building. This building had opened and
24	downtown was packed with people to watch the
25	Old Robert Meyer hotel come down so that the

1	federal courthouse could be built.
2	Are you making accommodations with JSO
3	to, I mean, anticipate traffic from
4	because I think the traffic constraints in
5	and around the St. Johns River Power Park
6	are probably going to be a little bit more
7	challenging than a city block downtown.
8	Have you put that into the plan?
9	MR. POPE: To the Chair
10	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: I suspect people
11	are going to once you advertise this,
12	they're probably going to show up early on
13	Saturday morning to watch this.
14	MR. POPE: To the Chair, we are
15	notifying approximately 3,300 property
16	owners within the vicinity of the power
17	park.
18	And back up a little bit on the road
19	closures, that's coordinated with JSO. They
20	will be out there helping us with that.
21	But as far as the notification to those
22	in the general vicinity, that is happening.
23	They will be notified of the road closures.
24	We are letting people know that there is no
25	general public viewing area and that, should

1	they choose to view this from somewhere, to
2	please make safety their number one
3	priority. With the road closures, we will
4	be keeping people the required distances
5	away for that safety, but we still want to
6	make sure they understand that there are
7	many, many places you can see the towers
8	from, so we hope that people will take
9	advantage of some of these viewing areas as
10	opposed to clogging New Berlin Road, but
11	that is part of our outreach to the
12	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: And what are the
13	road closures again?
14	MR. POPE: It's New Berlin Road from
15	Faye Road to Port Jacksonville Parkway. And
16	I believe Island Drive, which is within that
17	distance. So it's a very limited road
18	closure. I'll send you the map.
19	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: That brings me to
20	my second point. When the cruise ship first
21	arrived here in Jacksonville, when it made
22	its first port of call to the terminal west
23	of the Dames Point Bridge, they closed the
24	Dames Point Bridge when it arrived. Do you
25	know why they did that?

MR. POPE: To make sure the boat wasn't going to hit the bridge when it went under.

CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Well, no. They did that because they didn't want motorists freaking out with a boat looking like it was going to hit the bridge.

So there are no plans to temporarily close I-295? Because I can only imagine somebody from Virginia making their way home from Jacksonville at 8 o'clock in the morning and they see two 400-foot concrete towers crumbling off their passenger window.

MR. POPE: To the Chair, I believe we have reached out to FDOT to ask if they would help us with their electronic signage along 295 to notify people it is an implosion event.

CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Well, I suspect
you'll have cars lined up on the emergency
lane with their cameras ready to capture
that event. I would hope that you would
encourage FHP to consider a temporary
closure, because that's a recipe for -- you
know what happens when there is an accident,
right. I mean, this is like an accident to

1	the 15th power. That's all I'm going to say
2	about that.
3	MR. POPE: Thank you.
4	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: All right. Thank
5	you, Mr. Pope.
6	We have two speakers, Raymond Diaz,
7	followed by Dwight Brisbane. Mr. Diaz.
8	MR. DIAZ: Raymond Olan Diaz, IBEW 2358,
9	vice president. My address is on record.
10	Glad to see you guys are doing well. Glad
11	to (inaudible).
12	The only thing that I was concerned
13	about is that I saw an article that came out
14	by Eye on Jacksonville this last week about
15	how they select the procedures. And my
16	question was to you guys, if the procedures
17	were not followed, is it legal? Is there
18	any consequence behind it? Because they
19	deny there was procedures, but according to
20	Ms. Fisher if I'm correct yep, there
21	are some procedures there from before. So
22	somebody broke the rules and there is no
23	follow-up on it. And I just want to make
24	sure that, if we're going to follow the
25	rules for everybody, it does follow them

1	too. If you guys are willing to forward and
2	look into it, I would appreciate it.
3	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Mr. Diaz, are you
4	referring to the selection process for the
5	current CEO?
6	MR. DIAZ: Yes, sir.
7	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Yeah. I'm not
8	sure that quite fits into the charge of this
9	Committee at this point. I appreciate your
10	concern. And I think there may be a couple
11	Council Members that are probably looking
12	into that. But I don't think it's going to
13	be the topic of this Committee.
14	MR. DIAZ: So do you recommend some way
15	I can follow through so I can do legal
16	action or should I go through
17	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: I would ask if
18	there are any Council Members here present
19	today that are working on that, if they
20	would reach out to you. And they certainly
21	have access to your information.
22	MR. DIAZ: Yes, sir. They sure do.
23	Thank you very much.
24	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: I think that's a
25	little bit beyond where we're supposed to be

1	going.
2	MR. DIAZ: Okay. I understand.
3	CHAIRMAN CRESCIMBENI: Mr. Brisbane, he
4	doesn't want to speak.
5	Okay. Well, that's it. I appreciate
6	everyone being here today. Anybody have
7	further announcements?
8	He did have some notes on here. You
9	want me to read these notes into the record?
10	Okay. So Mr. Brisbane's card, he checked
11	comments from the public, subject Plant
12	Vogtle, when will the City Council look into
13	recovering the money spent on Plant Vogtle,
14	also JEA should be given the assistance of
15	the Council to get out of the contract with
16	Plant Vogtle. That's, I guess, maybe what
17	he would have said if he had wanted to
18	speak.
19	All right. Thank you all for being
20	here. We'll not have a meeting next week.
21	If that's noticed, we'll need to cancel that
22	meeting. And we'll reconvene here Thursday
23	at 3:30 on the 21st. Thank you all for
24	being here. This meeting is adjourned.
