## PROJECT GOALS

- **NARCAN** Expand community access to NARCAN - a nasal spray that can temporarily reverse the life-threatening effects of opioid overdose
- **EDUCATION** Educate community partners and first responders on recognizing signs of overdose and availability and use of NARCAN
- **REFERRAL** Connect and refer persons with substance use disorder (SUD) to treatment and recovery services
- **DATA** Collect and analyze data to develop data-driven strategies to further prevent opioid overdose deaths

## PROJECT PARTNERS

- **Community Outreach and Education** Drug Free Duval has contracted with the city to provide "Signs of Overdose and NARCAN Administration" training to community members, organizations, and businesses.
- **Treatment Centers** Gateway Community Services has contracted with the city to purchase and store the NARCAN, and to distribute to local substance use treatment providers and community-based organizations.

## USE OF NARCAN & LIVES SAVED

Reported use of the NARCAN provided under this project is encouraged, but not required. In an effort to not discourage individuals from receiving NARCAN, no identifiable information is collected. However, thus far we have received **thirty-nine (39) reports of use of the NARCAN to save a person** who may have otherwise died from an overdose. This is an additional three (3) lives reported saved since the Oct. 2021 report. Although there is no way to know for sure, we suspect that the actual number of NARCAN kits used is much greater. JFRD call data shows that the instances in which NARCAN was administered by a layperson prior to JFRD arrival rose significantly after the SHN Project began.

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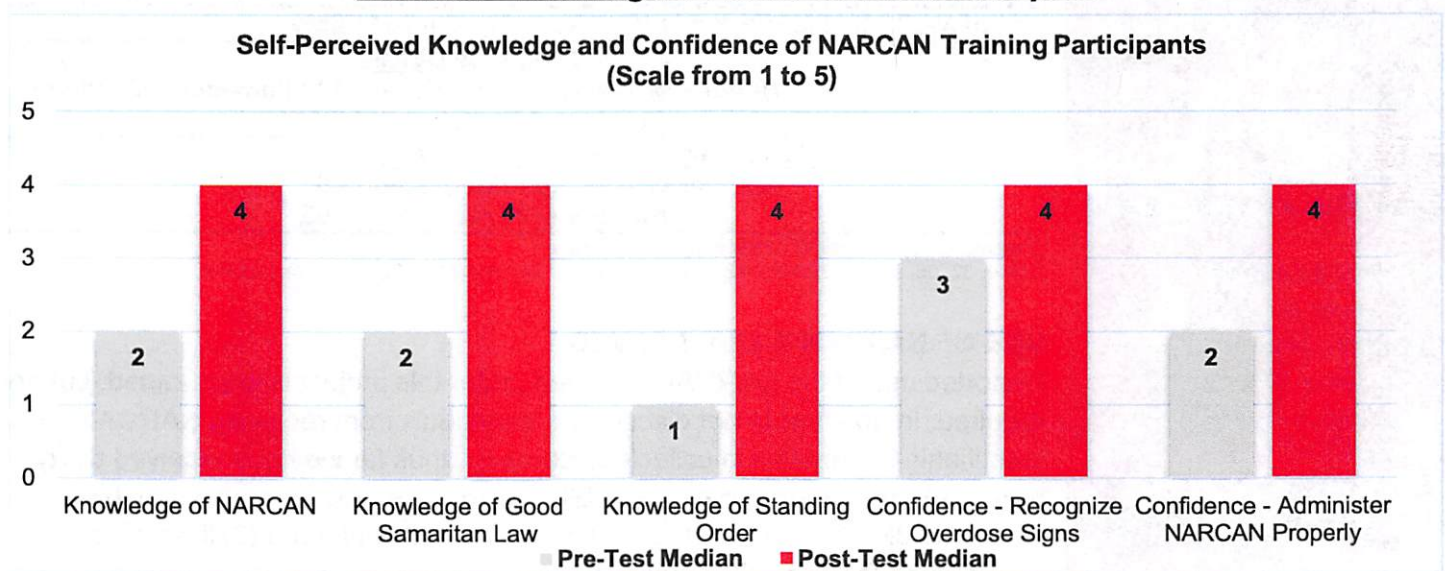

## NARCAN Training Pre-and Post-Test Analysis



**Addressing Stigma and Behaviors:** The Narcan training Pre-Test shows that 10% of participants believe access to NARCAN encourages drug use. In the Post-Test, less than 3% of participants report this. In the Post-test, more than 80% of participants report that they are "Very" or "Extremely Likely" to carry their NARCAN kit with them most of the time when in public, and 90% report that they are "Very" or "Extremely Likely" to administer the NARCAN if they witness a known or suspected overdose.
