To build and ensure access to a continuum of comprehensive and integrated programs, services, and activities that address the critical needs of children and youth.



ESSENTIAL SERVICES

EARLY LEARNING

Early Learning programs and services are intended to affect early childhood and youth development, prevent maltreatment and adequately prepare children and youth for entry into school.



4,320 children served & impacted by the ELC's scholarships and ESC CoachJax program

392 Teachers served through CoachJax training program

90% of programs scored between high to very high range for State Rule (HB 1091) CLASS Observation scores.

"The highest rate of return (13%) in early childhood development comes from investing as early as possible, from birth through age five, in disadvantaged families."

TUVENILE TUSTICE

The Kids Hope Alliance collaborates with the State Attorney's Office, Dept. of Juvenile Justice, the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office, and local programs to provide wrap around programming for the prevention and intervention of juvenile delinquent behavior.

600+ youth served

87% reduction in recidivism for youth who successfully completed one-year post discharge.

Researchers found that in 63.4% of 443 studies about the juvenile justice system, young people who received interventions emphasizing community-based treatment were less likely to recidivate than those who were incarcerated. ²

OUT OF SCHOOL TIME

We build access to, and equitable participation in, child-friendly out-of-school and summer programs. These programs give them academic enrichment, opportunities for mentorship, and social and emotional development.





Research shows that every \$1 invested in afterschool programs saves at least \$3 by Increasing kids earning potential and performance at school; Reducing crime and juvenile delinquency ³



OUT OF SCHOOL TIME GRANTS

KHA receives grants from the Florida Department of Education, the Florida Department of Health and the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. The money from these grants fund four additional afterschool programs and provide meals and snacks for thousands of local kids.



358,500+ meals & snacks served to local children & youth at 100 sites around Duval County

Over 12,000 children and youth served in over 32 KHA funded providers at 100+

Research shows that well-nourished children are healthier, more attentive, and have better mental performance than children who are under-nourished. ⁴

PRE-TEEN AND TEEN

Through programs such as the Mayor's Youth at Work Partnership and the Mayor's Young Leaders Advisory Council, the Kids Hope Alliance is helping local teens with college preparedness and job readiness.

SPECIAL NEEDS

KHA funds services and programs that support children with disabilities, mental health issues, and special needs, as well as their families.



2,130 children received assistance through KHA funded mental health programs

KHA has funded **66 therapists in 97 schools** throughout Duval County through the Full Service School Model



98% of families, after one year completing the Healthy Families program, that are free of verified incidents of child abuse and neglect.
