
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Existing Conditions - Process









What are "Neighborhood Parks"?



- Neighborhood Parks provide close-to-home park services with basic recreational amenities for casual use such as play areas and sportscourts.
- Current size definition: 1-20 acres
- 177 parks are classified as Neighborhood Parks
 - 143 urban parks
 - 31 suburban parks
 - 1 rural
 - 2 parks in the Beaches communities
- The majority of the parks (62% 110 parks) meet the size guidelines, while just over a third (36% - 64 parks) are smaller than an acre and only 3 parks are larger than 20 acres.
- Most undersized parks (58) are within urban development area
- Current Level of Service: 1 mile county-wide







What are "Community Parks"?



- Community Parks serve a larger population and provide the same amenities as Neighborhood Parks plus additional passive and active amenities including lit athletic fields, typically for practice and casual use, and parking.
- Current size definition: 20-50 acres
- 93 parks are classified as Community Parks
 - 59 urban parks
 - 33 suburban parks
 - 1 rural
- Only 18 parks (19%) meet the current size definition, while the majority (75% 70 parks) are smaller than 20 acres, indicating a need to adjust the definition.
- Community Centers are included within 12 of these parks.
- Current Level of Service: 3 mile county-wide






What are "Regional Parks"?



- Regional Parks have the largest geographic draw and include all the amenities of Neighborhood Parks plus additional passive and active recreation including lit fields/sportscourts, parking, and restrooms. These parks are often the site of organized sports events
- Current size definition: 50+ acres
- 16 parks are classified as Regional Parks
 - 4 urban parks
 - 12 suburban parks
- All but 2 parks (within the urban area) meet the current definition, however, these parks are currently able to accommodate their uses.
- Current Level of Service: 10 mile county-wide



Other Park Types



- Other Park Types:
 - Preservation
 - Specialty
 - Boat Ramps
 - Golf Course
 - Pool
 - Undeveloped
- These sites are considered opportunistic and do not have a geographic Level of Service

- ☐ Incorporate resilient design strategies
- Respond to extreme emergencies
- Increase nature-based outdoor recreation areas

- Provide facilities to escape heat
- Leverage parks as buffer for heat, tidal flows, and flooding
