PASS HOUSE BILL 981 AND SENATE BILL 1066
"NORTHEAST FLORIDA RIVERS, SPRING, AND COMMUNITY
INVESTMENT ACT; DIRECTING LEGISLATIVE SERVICES
TO CIRCULATE THIS RESOLUTION TO THE FLORIDA
LEGISLATURE; REQUESTING ONE CYCLE EMERGENCY

WHEREAS, Flowing north, the Ocklawaha River is the primary
tributary for the St. Johns River, which flows through the heart of
Jacksonville, Florida; and

WHEREAS, House Bill 981 and Senate Bill 1066, also known as the
The Northeast Florida Rivers, Springs, and Community Investment Act,
will require the Department of Environmental Protection to develop a
project plan for the restoration of the Ocklawaha River, create a
Northeast Florida River and Springs Recreation and Economic
Development Advisory Council, and requiring an Outdoor Recreation
Plan; and

WHEREAS, the City of Jacksonville supports the Northeast Florida
River and Springs Recreation and Economic Development Advisory
Council's proposed membership of river recreation-related businesses
local to the Counties impacted, members of the Florida Fish and
Wildlife Conservation Commission, members of fishing groups, and
members working in parks and recreation, as balanced and vital to
making recommendations for this environmental restoration; and

WHEREAS, City of Jacksonville is supportive of the required
outdoor recreation plan which must identify and implement projects

1 for enhanced and expanded river and springs access for recreational
2 activities, such as fishing, hunting, swimming, wildlife viewing,
